



#### TODAY'S GAME



#### The Game

Ohio (9-3, 6-2 MAC) and Georgia Southern (6-6, 3-5 SBC) meet in the fourth annual Myrtle Beach Bowl at Brooks Stadium in Conway, South Carolina. The game kicks off at 11:00 a.m. (ET) and will be televised by ESPN.

Both teams will be making their first Myrtle Beach Bowl appearance.

Ohio (9-3, 6-2 MAC) capped off the regular season with a three-game winning streak to record their second-straight season with nine wins or more. The Bobcats won four of their final five conference games to finish second in the East Division. For the season, Ohio paced the Mid-American Conference defensively by allowing just 15.4 points per game and a conference-low 264.4 yards per game.

Georgia Southern (6-6, 3-5 SBC) reached bowl eligibility for the second season in a row with a 44-27 win over Georgia State on October 26th. The Eagles took down Sun Belt opponents Coastal Carolina, ULM, and Georgia State before dropping their final four games to finish fifth in the East Division. During the season, the Eagles topped the Sun Belt Conference in passing yards per game at 298.3.

#### The Series

The Myrtle Beach Bowl will be the first-ever meeting between Ohio and Georgia Southern.

#### Ohio Bowl History

The Bobcats will be making their 15th bowl game appearance with the 2023 Myrtle Beach Bowl, holding a 6-8 record. Ohio grabbed an overtime win over Wyoming in the 2022 Barstool Sports Arizona Bowl 30-27 in their last bowl game appearance.

Ohio made their bowl debut in the 1962 Sun Bowl, falling to West Texas A&M 15-14 in El Paso, Texas. With their appearance in this year's Myrtle Beach Bowl, the Bobcats have been to a bowl game in seven of the last nine seasons.

#### Georgia Southern Bowl History

The Eagles will be making their sixth bowl game appearance since moving to the FBS level in 2014. Overall, Georgia Southern holds a 3-2 record in bowl games, including a 23-21 win over Buffalo in the 2022 Camellia Bowl.

After joining the FBS level and the Sun Belt Conference in 2014, the Eagles made their bowl debut with a 58-27 win over Bowling Green in the 2015 GoDaddy Bowl. Georgia Southern has now been to a bowl game in six of the nine years they've been eligible.

Myrtle Beach Bowl History
The inaugural Myrtle Beach Bowl was held on Dec. 21, 2020, and featured a 56-28 victory for Appalachian State (SBC) over North Texas (C-USA) at Brooks Stadium. Mountaineers' running back Cameron Peoples set the all-time NCAA bowl game record with 317 rushing yards and five touchdowns in the win.

In 2021. Tulsa (AAC) defeated Old Dominion (C-USA) 30-17 on December 21, 2021, at Brooks Stadium. Golden Hurricane quarterback Davis Brin threw for 285 yards and two touchdowns and was named MVP after the game.

Last year, Marshall (SBC) held off UConn to grab a 28-14 victory on December 20th, 2022 at Brooks Stadium. Thundering Herd running back Rasheen Ali rushed for 92 yards and one touchdown to bring home MVP honors.









### Eagles Part of Record Sun Belt Bowl Representation Georgia Southern is part of a record-breaking group of postseason

Georgia Southern is part of a record-breaking group of postseason teams for the Sun Belt Conference this bowl season.

The Eagles are one of 12 Sun Belt teams that will participate in a bowl game in 2023, outpacing the totals from the ACC (11), Big Ten (9), Big 12 (9), SEC (9) and Pac-12 (8). No other non-autonomy conference has more than seven Bowl Season representatives.

The previous Sun Belt Conference record was seven teams.

#### **Bobcats Continue Making History**

For the second consecutive year, the Ohio Bobcats have put together a nine-win regular season. This marks the first time the Bobcats have won nine games in consecutive regular seasons in program history.

Ohio enters the 2023 Myrtle Beach Bowl having won three straight to finish the regular season.

The Bobcats are one of six teams from the Mid-American Conference to receive a bowl invitation. This marks the eighth time in MAC history to have six or more programs receive a bowl invitation (2012, 2015, 2016, 2018, 2019, 2021, 2022, 2023) in a single-season. This also marks the 14th time in MAC history to have five or more programs receive a bowl invitation in a single-season.

#### **BROOKS STADIUM**



The Coastal Carolina University football stadium officially opened as Brooks Stadium on Sept. 6, 2003, for the inaugural home game of the Chanticleer football program. Scoring a touchdown with just seconds left on the clock, the Chanticleers defeated Newberry College 21-14.

With a gift from the late businessman Bob Brooks, the stadium was named in honor of Brooks' children Coby Garrett and Boni Belle. The \$2 million gift was among the largest gifts ever made to the University.

Brooks, who grew up on a farm in Loris, S.C., was the CEO and founder of Eastern Foods, Inc., creators of the Naturally Fresh line of products, and chairman of Hooters of America, Inc. He also created Hooters Air Charter Airline, the National Golf Association Hooters Tour and the Hooters ProCup Series, a series of short-track races in small towns throughout the Southeast and Midwest. Brooks died in 2006.

Phase I of the stadium construction included 6,408 seats, while Phase II added almost 1,000 additional seats prior to the 2006 season. The third phase of Brooks Stadium was completed in 2010 when approximately 1,600 seats were added directly behind the north end zone. Affectionately referred to as the Chantourage section, the seating directly in front of the field house was designated as the student section in 2011.

Brooks Stadium has been ranked among the top stadiums in the nation in attendance based on

capacity. In 2010, the Chanticleers hosted a first-round NCAA Division I Football Championship playoff game against Western Illinois. The game marked the first postseason game played in Brooks Stadium.

On Feb. 15, 2013, the women's lacrosse team opened its inaugural season on its new home field inside Brooks Stadium. Women's lacrosse was the 18th Division I sports program for the Chanticleers.

The facility underwent a major transformation in the spring of 2015 as Benton Field went from natural grass to artificial teal turf ... or "The Surf Turf." The first pieces of Powerblade SD turf were laid on April 2 and the project was completed later that month. The project had a budget of \$1.2 million.

Brooks Stadium was designed and built with the capability to expand from its inception. That original design is coming to fruition as Coastal embarked on another two-phase expansion in the spring of 2017 that will ultimately bring the capacity to approximately 20,000.

The first phase boosted the seating capacity to at 15,000 and included adding seats to both corners of the end zone nearest the field house, expanding the sections closest to the field on both sides toward the scoreboard, and expanding the upper deck on the east side to match the length of the lower deck.

Prior to the 2019 season, a second level and premium suites were completed on the west side to increase the capacity to 20,000. The cost of the two-phase project was \$31.8 million.



# APPALACHIAN STATE 56, NORTH TEXAS 28

The inaugural Myrtle Beach Bowl will be remembered as a record-setting day for Appalachian State sophomore running back Cameron Peoples.

The Lineville, Ala., native had 29 carries for 317 yards and five rushing touchdowns in the 56-28 win over North Texas at Brooks Stadium. Peoples set the all-time NCAA bowl record with 317 rushing yards and five rushing touchdowns. He scored on runs of 3, 64, 62, 4, and 11 yards for the Mountaineers.

Peoples broke the single-game bowl record for most rushing yards, previously held by Georgia Tech's PJ Daniels, who had 307 rushing yards against Tulsa in the 2004 Humanitarian Bowl.

Peoples also became the seventh player in NCAA history to score five rushing touchdowns in a bowl game. Toledo's Kareem Hunt (2014 Go-Daddy.com) and Barry Sanders (1988 Holiday Bowl) are two of the notable names on the list.

Appalachian State (9-3) became the fourth team in NCAA history to rush for 500 or more yards in a bowl game. The Mountaineers ran the ball 49 times for 502 yards and six rushing touchdowns in the win. ASU's 502 rushing yards are the fourth-most by a team in NCAA bowl history.



Peoples wasn't the only ASU player that found success on the ground against the Mean Green. Senior running back Marcus Williams, Jr., recorded 101 rushing yards and one touchdown on six carries. He scored on a 70-yard run to push ASU's lead to 28-7 with 2:29 left in the first half.

Peoples and Williams combined for 420 rushing yards, the second-highest rushing total by a pair of teammates in NCAA bowl history. Baylor's Johnny Jefferson (299) and Devin Chafin (161) combined for 460 rushing yards against North Carolina in the 2015 Russell Athletic Bowl.

North Texas (4-6) had success on the ground as well. The Mean Green ran the ball 59 times for 242 yards. Tre Siggers had 17 carries for 120 yards, while teammate Oscar Adaway added 26 carries for 97 yards and one touchdown.

ASU (502) and North Texas (242) combined for 742 rushing yards, the fourth-most combined rushing yards in NCAA bowl history.

Appalachian State scored on five touchdowns of seven first-half possessions to take a 35-14 halftime lead.

# TULSA 30, OLD DOMINION 17

The Tulsa Golden Hurricane (7-6) passed for 285 yards and rushed for 244 more in a 30-17 win over the Old Dominion Monarchs (6-7) in the second edition of the Myrtle Beach Bowl on Monday evening. Tulsa's offense held the ball for just under 40 minutes in the program's 11th bowl game victory.

Tulsa finished off their season with four consecutive wins, while Old Dominion dropped their first game since October 16th and saw their five-game winning streak snapped. The postseason matchup was the first-ever meeting between the two teams.

Golden Hurricane quarterback Davis Brin completed 22 of 34 passes for 285 yards and two touchdowns in the victory. The redshirt junior was named Myrtle Beach Bowl MVP following the game after setting a Myrtle Beach Bowl game record for passing yards.

Brin connected with senior receiver Josh Johnson for eight receptions and 129 yards, including a 23-yard touchdown catch in the opening quarter. Redshirt senior receiver JuanCarlos Santana added six catches for 75 yards, while redshirt sophomore tight end Ethan Hall caught a four-yard touchdown pass for his lone reception of the night. Senior running back Shamari Brooks rushed for 109 yards on 26 carries and a touchdown to help the attack.



After surrendering a 100-yard kickoff return to begin the game, the Golden Hurricane defense gave up just 10 more points the rest of the game and held Old Dominion to only 71 rushing yards in the contest. Graduate student linebacker Yohance Burnett led the team in tackles with six total, with senior defensive lineman Jaxon Player added the team's only sack with his five total tackles.

Graduate student kicker Zack Long knocked in field goals of 25, 32, and 35 yards to set a new season high.

Old Dominion tallied 247 yards of total offense and converted five of their 11 third downs in their second-ever bowl appearance. Monarchs' redshirt freshman quarterback Hayden Wolff threw for 176 yards on 19 completions and one interception in the defeat. Sophomore wide receiver Ali Jennings III was Wolff's favorite target with six receptions for 74 yards. Redshirt sophomore running back Blake Watson led the rushing attack with 77 yards on 14 carries and a two-yard touchdown.

Freshman linebacker Jason Henderson led the Monarch defense with nine solo tackles and season-high and 13 total, with redshirt junior safety R'Tarriun Johnson also collecting 13 stops setting a Myrtle Beach Bowl record for tackles. Senior linebacker Jordan Young posted his second sack of the year and was a force in the Golden Hurricane backfield with three tackles for loss.

# MARSHALL 28, UCONN 14

Despite a late scare, the Marshall Thundering Herd (9-4) held off the UConn Huskies (6-7) 28-14 to claim the third annual Myrtle Beach Bowl title on Monday evening. Marshall forced four turnovers in route to the program's 13th bowl victory, and first since 2018.

The Thundering Herd ended their season on a five-game winning streak, the first time they have finished a season with five straight wins since 2002. Making their first bowl appearance in seven years, the Huskies dropped their second-consecutive game to Marshall, falling in the 2015 St. Petersburg Bowl 16-10.

Marshall running back Rasheen Ali rushed for 92 yards on 15 carries with a long of 38 in the victory. The redshirt-sophomore was named Myrtle Beach Bowl MVP for his performance.

With Ali leading the rushing attack, quarterback Cam Fancher completed 10 of 20 passing attempts for 93 yards with two touchdowns and an interception. The redshirt-freshman connected with six different receivers, with Corey Gammage leading the way with three receptions for 50 yards, including a nine-yard touchdown catch for the first score of the game. The offense finished with 303 yards of total offense, with 210 coming on the ground.



As they have been all year, the Thundering Herd defense was impressive as they held a team to 21 points or less for the ninth time this season. Marshall picked off UConn three times with Micah Abraham, Damion Barber Jr., and Gammage all collecting interceptions. Eli Neal racked up 10 total tackles with  $1 \frac{1}{2}$  tackles for loss and a pass breakup to pace the defense.

After falling behind early, UConn found their offense in the second half with 189 of their 316 total yards coming after halftime. Freshman quarter-back Zion Turner committed four turnovers with three interceptions and one fumble. Turner passed for 166 yards while completing nine of his 27 attempts. His favorite target on the day was sophomore wide receiver Aaron Turner, who made five catches for 65 yards and a long of 33.

The Husky offense was balanced with 172 yards through the air and 144 on the ground. Freshman running back Victor Rosa found the end zone twice on runs of 14 and 24 yards while finishing the game with 75 yards on 16 rushes.

The Huskie's defense forced two turnovers on a forced fumble by senior linebacker lan Swenson and an interception by redshirt-sophomore defensive back Malik Dixon-Williams. Graduate linebacker Brandon Bouyer-Randle collected 10 total tackles to lead the Huskies.

Today, as one University, Georgia Southern is the state's largest and most comprehensive center of higher education south of I-20.




Jared Benko
Director of Athletics

Jared Benko was hired in March of 2020 as the leader of the Georgia Southern Athletics Department and began his new role on April 1. Benko, who has more than a decade of progressive leadership experience in the Southeastern Conference (SEC), came to Statesboro from Mississippi State where he served as Deputy Director of Athletics/Chief Financial Officer for nearly four years (2016-2020). Benko reports directly to the University president, serves as a member of the President's Cabinet and oversees 17 NCAA Division I varsity athletics programs, 16 of which compete in the Sun Belt Conference.

His first year was unprecedented in more ways than one as Benko had to navigate a college landscape altered by COVID-19. The Eagle football team was on of two FBS teams (Alabama) to play 13 games and just one of two (Texas State) to play all 12 regular season contests. The football season was capped by a win over Louisiana Tech in the R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl. Three Georgia Southern teams captured conference championships (rifle, women's tennis, men's golf) and the Athletic Foundation recorded record fundraising numbers and prospect visits in the 2020-21 campaign. Two major projects were also approved by the USG, changing the future facility landscape of Georgia Southern athletics.

The momentum gained in his first year was carried on to 2021-22 as the department soared to new heights. The rifle and women's golf teams captured conference titles, while the women's soccer, men's golf and baseball teams reached the championship games. He led a team that put together a bid that secured an NCAA Baseball Regional, the first in program history. Three spring sports (baseball, men's golf and women's golf) all made post-season NCAA play, marking the first time in department history that has happened. Benko also made a national splash with the hiring of former Southern Cal head coach Clay Helton as the Eagles' new head man, a hire that was rated as one of the best in the country by some media. In the classroom, the department tied the mark for the highest GPA and the Athletic Foundation topped its record-breaking effort of the prior year.

The Athletic Foundation raised a record \$10.6 million in new pledges and outright gifts – more than 68% over the previous record set in FY22 of \$6.3 million – which included a record \$7.4 million in major gifts. Ground was broken on the Anthony P. Tippins Indoor Practice Facility and the Hill Convocation Center, giving the department more than \$70 million in new projects.










### HEAD COACH





The 51-year-old Helton went 46-24 (.657) as the head coach of the USC Trojans with 12 victories over AP Top 25 teams, including three in the Top 5 and four in the Top 10. He went 5-1 in a pandemic-shortened 2020 season and was 8-5 in 2019 with wins over No. 23 Stanford and No. 10 Utah. Helton went 11-3 in 2017 with wins over No. 14 Stanford twice (including in the Pac-12 Championship Game) and No. 23 Arizona, and went 10-3 in 2016 with wins over No. 4 Washington, No. 5 Penn State in a legendary Rose Bowl thriller and No. 21 Colorado.

Helton was the first USC head coach to have 10-win seasons in each of his first two full seasons, and he had more wins (21) in his first two full seasons than any USC coach. He led USC to a 13-game winning streak from 2016 to 2017 and a 13-game winning streak over Power 5 opponents from 2016 to 2017.

Helton joined the USC staff in February of 2010 as the quarterbacks coach after spending 10 seasons as an assistant at Memphis. He added the passing game coordinator role in 2012 and became the offensive coordinator in 2013.

Helton began his 10-year (2000-09) Memphis career as the running backs coach for three seasons, then coached the Tigers'





receivers for the next four seasons before becoming the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for the final three years. He served as Memphis' interim head coach for several months in early 2006 when head coach Tommy West had off-season heart surgery.

Before Memphis, he was the running backs coach at Houston, his alma mater, for three seasons (1997-99), working under his father, head coach Kim Helton. He began his coaching career at Duke, serving as a graduate assistant in 1995 and then the running backs coach in 1996.

Helton played quarterback at Houston in 1993 and 1994, playing for his father both seasons and captaining the Cougars as a 1994 senior. He spent 1991 and 1992 at Auburn, where he earned 1992 SEC All-Academic honors. He redshirted there in











1990.

Helton earned his bachelor's degree in mathematics and interdisciplinary science from Houston in 1994 and prepped at Clements High in Sugar Land, Texas.

Helton was born on June 24, 1972, in Gainesville, Florida. He and his wife, Angela, have three children: sons Reid and Turner, and daughter Aubrey. Turner is a redshirt freshman quarterback at Western Kentucky.

Besides being Houston's head coach from 1993 to 1999, his father, Kim, was an assistant in college (Florida, Miami, and Alabama Birmingham), the NFL (Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Houston Oilers, Los Angeles Raiders, Washington Redskins), and the CFL (Toronto Argonauts) following his playing career at Florida.

His brother, Tyson, was the quarterbacks coach and pass game coordinator at USC (2016-17) until becoming Tennessee's offensive coordinator in 2018 and is now the head coach at Western Kentucky.

Behind a multi-dimensional offensive attack, the Georgia Southern football team shut out The Citadel 34-0 to open its 2023 campaign at Allen E. Paulson Stadium. The victory marked the 21st shutout in Paulson Stadium and the second shutout in home opener history.

In his Georgia Southern debut, quarterback Davis Brin threw for 236 yards and two touchdowns on 27 of 36 passing to lead the Eagles. Running back Jalen White returned from injury to rush for 125 yards and a score on 16 carries to average 6.6 yards per carry.

The Eagles marched down the field on the opening drive to get on the board first. OJ Arnold rushed to the right for a 1-yard touchdown to put the Eagles out in front. On the final drive of the half, Brin completed four consecutive passes, highlighted by a 30-yard pass to Derwin Burgess Jr., before he completed a pass up the middle to Burgess Jr. for a 13-yard touchdown. Georgia Southern opened up the second half scoring on a Brin pass deep up the middle completed to Anthony Queeley for a 16-yard touchdown.

The defense held steady throughout the game, holding The Citadel to 212 total yards. Midway through the second quarter, Davon Gilmore stopped a Bulldog drive with a forced fumble that was recovered by Tyrell Davis to ensure a shutout.





A late interception by TJ Smith and a big offensive night from Davis Brin and OJ Arnold helped propel the Georgia Southern football team to a 49-35 victory over UAB at Allen E. Paulson Stadium in non-conference action.

On the opening play of the game, Khadry Jackson forced a Blazer fumble before Justin Rhodes recovered the ball on the UAB 19-yard line. The Eagle offense capitalized on the turnover to take an early lead on a 5-yard touchdown reception from Jalen White. On the next drive, the Eagles extended the lead on a 5-yard touchdown run from Brin.

The Blazers rallied in the second quarter, scoring on back-to-back drives to take the lead, 22-21. Georgia Southern would retake the lead before the half on an explosive 39-yard touchdown run by Arnold, heading into the half up 28-22.

The GS defense forced its second turnover at the beginning of the fourth quarter, a pick Smith at the Georgia Southern 38-yard line, his first interception as an Eagle. White punched the ball into the end zone on a 6-yard run and a successful two-point conversion put the Eagles up 43-29.

With under five minutes left in the fourth quarter, Khaleb Hood broke the Georgia Southern career receiving yards surpassing Monty Sharp with 1,855 career yards.



The Georgia Southern football squad hung tough with Big Ten foe Wisconsin, but the Badgers scored four second-half touchdowns to pull away with a 35-14 win at Camp Randall Stadium in non-conference action.

After a scoreless first quarter, Wisconsin opened the second quarter with a short score, but Georgia Southern responded on the next drive. After Davis Brin hit Derwin Burgess Jr. for a career-long 68yard reception, running back OJ Arnold scored from 4-yards out to tie things up. On its first drive of the second half, Georgia Southern claimed the lead to go up 14-7 when Jjay Mcafee recorded his fifth career touchdown reception on a 25yard completion from Brin. The Badgers responded with three touchdowns in the third quarter—two off of Brin interceptions—to take the lead back and pulled away in the fourth quarter with one last score.

Burgess Jr. led the offense with eight catches for 124 yards. It marked his fourth-career 100-yard receiving game. Arnold ran for a career-high 66 yards.


Defensively, the Eagles were stout for a majority of the game but Wisconsin took control in the second half. The six Eagle turnovers kept the GS defense on the field and Wisconsin eventually started to move the ball. Marques Watson-Trent led the team in tackles with nine stops.











Davis Brin threw four touchdown passes, Michael Lantz hit four field goals and the defense allowed just 197 yards of total offense as the Georgia Southern football squad blew past Ball State, 40-3, at Sheumann Stadium in non-conference action.

On the first drive, Brin connected with Evan Lester Jr. for a 1-yard scoring pass. On the second drive, OJ Arnold's 38-yard run up the middle set up a 9-yard touchdown pass from Brin to Keaton Upshaw. The second quarter consisted of three field goals from Lantz (41, 26, 37 yards).

In the second half, Khaleb Hood went over then 2,000 career receiving yard mark with a 35-yard catch down the sideline. Three plays later, he caught a 21-yard touchdown from Brin as he went over 100 yards receiving for the fifth time to tie the school record (Raja Andrews). In the fourth quarter, Brin connected on his fourth touchdown of the day, this one an 8-yard scoring pass to Anthony Queeley.

Brin finished the day 34-for-46 for 344 yards and four scores. Hood caught seven passes for 107 yards. Arnold led the way on the ground with 90 yards on nine carries. Defensively, Marc Stampley II led the way with eight tackles, including 2.5 for loss and a sack. Overall, the Eagles allowed just 37 yards rushing for the game with four sacks and two turnovers.





Behind a record-breaking crowd and touchdowns from five different Eagles, the Georgia Southern football team downed Coastal Carolina 38-28 in Sun Belt Conference action.

On the opening drive, Coastal Carolina quickly jumped out to an early lead as quarterback Grayson McCall ran it into the end zone to go up 7-0. The Eagles responded two drives later to open the second quarter when Derwin Burgess Jr. recorded his 11th career touchdown reception on a 2-yard catch from Davis Brin. The Chanticleers regained the lead 14-7 with 7:28 left in the second quarter before the Eagles evened the score with 3:54 left in the half as Brin completed a pass to Anthony Queeley for a 16-yard touchdown reception.

Georgia Southern took their first lead of the game after Cam Williams intercepted the ball on the Coastal 24-yard line and the Eagles drove down the field for the score when Brin hit Khaleb Hood for a 12-yard touchdown pass, making it 21-14 at the break. The Eagle defense stepped up in the third quarter with a pick-six by Khadry Jackson for his second career score and the first defensive touchdown of the season for its largest lead of the game.

The Eagles had five players score touchdowns and Hood tied the school record with 12 catches for 131 yards and a touchdown.



James Madison remained unbeaten on the season with a 41-13 victory over Georgia Southern at Bridgeforth Stadium in Sun Belt Conference football action.

The Dukes wasted little time in jumping out to a 14-0 lead in the first quarter, scoring on their first two drives with touchdown passes from Jordan McCloud. Georgia Southern finally got rolling on its fourth drive, using two big passes to tight end Keaton Upshaw to move the ball down the field before Michael Lantz connected from 43 yards out to make it 17-3. Lantz hit a short field goal at the end of the half to make it 20-6.

JMU scored three touchdowns in the third quarter to put the game away. After a JC French interception, the Dukes punched it in with a 20-yard scoring run from Black and then used a long punt return to set up a third touchdown in the quarter to make it 41-6. On the final drive of the game, David Mbadinga punched the ball into the end zone for his first career touchdown making the final score. 41-13.

Khaleb Hood led the receiving corps with 10 receptions for 78 yards. Brin connected on 25-of-42 passes for 204 yards and Jalen White ran for 50 yards. Defensively, Marques Watson-Trent led the way with seven tackles, including a sack









Tyrell Davis scored on a Pick Six with less than two minutes to go to seal a 38-28 Georgia Southern win over ULM at Allen E. Paulson Stadium.

Leading 14-7, the Eagles continued to apply pressure on the Warhawk offense, forcing three straight turnovers to set up the offense. Jalen White scored on a short 2-yard run after a strip sack and recovery by Isaac Walker. On the next ULM offensive play, Justin Meyers recovered the second fumble, which led to a 14yard touchdown pacatch from Keaton Upshaw. GS forced its third turnover of the game as TJ Smith intercepted Jiya Wright's pass to set up a 27-yard field goal from Michael Lantz with 2:05 left in the first half to make it 31.7. The Warhawks ralliled to get within three with seven minutes left in the game but Davis intercepted the ball on the 28-yard line for a pick-six to secure the victory, 38-28 with 1:53 left.

White led the Eagle offense with 164 rushing yards for his second 100-yard game of the season. Khaleb Hood led the receiving corps with eight catches for 98 yards. The Eagle defense recorded 11 tackles for loss, including five sacks, nine pass breakups and four turnovers (two fumble recoveries and two interceptions). Marques Watson-Trent led the way with 14 tackles, including three tackles for loss. Isaac Walker had 2.5 sacks and two forced fumbles.



Davis Brin threw for three touchdowns, Jalen White ran for over 100 yards and the defense got three takeaways as the Georgia Southern football team rolled past Georgia State 44-27 Thursday night in front 23,389 fans at Allen E. Paulson Stadium to become bowl eligible.

With the Eagles leading 27-7, Brin hit Cobb for a 76-yard touchdown in the third quarter to extend the lead. The Panthers crawled back into the game late in the third quarter with two quick touchdowns to cut into the lead, 34-21 but Michael Lantz made his third field goal of the game from 40-yards out to push the lead back out to 37-21.

The defense forced its second turnover when Marques Watson-Trent picked off Grainger, returning the ball 50 yards for a pick-six and his first career touchdown to seal the game. Khadry Jackson recovered a fumble for the third turnover late.

White led the offense with 25 carries for 116 yards including one touchdown. Khaleb Hood led the receiving corps with eight receptions for 75 yards. Brin completed 22 of 35 passes for 334 yards and a touchdown while Lantz connected on three field goals. Watson-Trent had eight tackles, a forced fumble and an interception while Tyrell Davis also had eight tackles. Walker had 1.5 tackles for loss, a blocked kick and his nation-leading fifth forced fumble.



Texas State quarterback TJ Finley threw for three touchdowns and ran for two more to lead the Bobcats to a 45-24 victory over Georgia Southern at Bobcat Stadium.

Texas State jumped out to an early lead on five plays in the opening drive. DeAndre Buchannon returned the kickoff 80 yards to set up a 29-yard field goal by Michael Lantz for an early 7-3 score. The Bobcats moved right back down the field, but a bad snap was recovered by Isaac Walker to thwart the drive. Jalen White took it to the house from 39-yards out on third and 15 to give the Eagles a 10-7 lead. Texas State scored three touchdowns in the second quarter, two on passes from Finley and a 16-yard run from the signal caller, and converted a field goal after an Eagle turnover to take a 31.10 lead into the locker room.


The Bobcat offense continued into the second half with two more touchdowns to stretch the lead to 35 points. The Eagles continued to fight as Davis Brin hit tight end Jjay Mcafee on a 32-yard touchdown pass late in the third quarter to break a 38-0 run by the Bobcats. Midway through the fourth quarter, White punched it in from 3 yards out to cut into the lead.

White led the offense with 159 yards and two touchdowns on the ground, recording his third-straight 100-yard game. Three Eagles posted double-digit tackle numbers.









Georgia Southern dropped a hard-fought 38-33 contest to Marshall at Joan C. Edwards Stadium in Sun Belt Conference action. Marshall took the opening kickoff 98 yards for an early 7-0 lead. Georgia Southern evened the score in the second quarter when Davis Brin completed a 9-yard pass to Jaylon Barden for Barden's first scoring catch as an Eagle. Marshall reclaimed the lead to go up 17-10 with five minutes to go in the half, but a 47-yard scoring reception by Dalen Cobb tied things up.

The Eagles got their second turnover of the half when Davion Rhodes forced a fumble on a sack that was recovered by Isaac Walker, his fourth of the year. That led to a 38-yard field goal from Lantz to give the Eagles their first lead of the game with 12 seconds left in the half.

Lantz connected from 40 yards out with 6:51 left in the third quarter to extend the lead. A big pass play from Marshall led to a 2-yard touchdown run by Rasheen Ali to give the Herd the lead back at 24-23. Lantz's fourth field goal of the game, this time from 21 yards, made it 26-24 in favor of the Eagles. After a hold by Marshall, Ali took the snap and took it 55 yards for the score to put the Herd back in front for good. Derwin Burgess Jr. added a late touchdown catch, but the Eagles couldn't recover the onsides kick.




Ethan Sanchez kicked a 22-yard field goal as time expired, lifting Old Dominion to a 20-17 victory over the Georgia Southern football squad inside Allen E. Paulson Stadium.

Georgia Southern and ODU traded unfruitful possessions in the first quarter, as both were held scoreless. The Monarchs got on the board first when a blocked punt set up an eventual 47-yard field goal early in the second quarter. ODU extended the lead 10-0 on a 12-yard scoring reception midway through the quarter.

On their sixth drive, the Eagles finally got moving, and Jalen White capped off a 75-yard drive with a 7-yard touchdown run to cut into the lead. The Eagles evened the score as Michael Lantz drilled a 24-yard field goal late in the third quarter. The field goal was Lantz's 21st make of the season, breaking the school record for most field goals in a season.

ODU took the lead late in the third quarter after a 27-yard reception set up a 30-yard touchdown pass to make it 17-10. Trailing by seven, Davis Brin engineered a big scoring drive, capped off by an 18-yard touchdown pass to Jjay Mcafee with 1:27 left.

The Monarchs quickly marched down the field, and Sanchez was the hero with his leg to secure the win.



App State scored 24 points in the second quarter to spark a rally and down Georgia Southern, 55-27, at Kidd Brewer Stadium to wrap up the regular season.

The Eagles got out to a quick start in the opening drive, going 75 yards on six plays. OJ Arnold punched the ball in from 3 yards out to give the Eagles an early 7-0 lead. App State cut into the lead on a 24-yard field goal to make it 7-3. Georgia Southern extended its lead 14-3 at the end of the first quarter when JC French completed his first career touchdown pass for 25 yards to Khaleb Hood. The Mountaineers took their first lead of the game with two touchdowns in 16 seconds with a 27-yard touchdown reception and a 13-yard touchdown reception one play later after GS fumbled on the kickoff.

DeAndre Buchannon provided a bright spot in the second half, returning a kickoff 100 yards to tie the school record for the longest return and marking the first kickoff return since 2019. Lantz added to his record total for field goals in a season with a 34-yarder midway through the fourth quarter.

With his fourth reception of the game, Hood set the single-season reception record with 88 catches, surpassing his own record of 87 set last season.

Ohio fell to San Diego State 20-13 in its Week 0 matchup at Snapdragon Stadium on Aug. 26.

Graduate student wide receiver Sam Wiglusz led Ohio with 10 receptions for 103 yards, followed by junior Miles Cross who scored Ohio's lone touchdown in the last two minutes of the game.

San Diego State marked redshirt senior O'Shaan Allison's first game since 2021; he had six carries for 27 yards. Freshman kicker Gianni Spetic also made his collegiate debut and went 2-for-3 on field goals and 1-for-1 on PATs.

Graduate student linebacker Bryce Houston led the Bobcats with 13 tackles, including seven solo stops.

Ohio held the lead throughout the second quarter of the game; however, San Diego State took the lead on an interception.

The Bobcats were unable to bounce back despite their last-minute touchdown.



Ohio kicked off its home schedule with a 24-10 win over LIU on Sept. 2.

Ohio notched the win by scoring on back-to-back drives in the second quarter.

Graduate student quarterback Parker Navarro made his first appearance since he sustained an injury in 2022. He split time at his position with graduate student C.J. Harris.

Freshman tight end Mason Williams scored his first career touchdown on a 32-yard pass from Navarro in the third quarter.

Sophomore Austin Brawley also had an interception in the win, which kept LIU's offense at bay.

The win marked Ohio's seventh-straight win at home.



Ohio earned its first road win of the season with a 17-10 routing of Florida Atlantic.

Graduate student Kurtis Rourke returned at quarterback for the Bobcats and threw for 203 yards and a touchdown.

Redshirt senior O'Shaan Allison led Ohio on the ground with 80 rushing yards on 22 carries, along with his first touchdown since 2019.

The Bobcats opened the game with back-to-back interceptions to put the ball back in their hands, however they still had to work out of a deficit.

Freshman kicker Alex Kasee knocked in his first career PAT to help out the Bobcats, but it was the defense that gave them the edge.


Graduate student Keye Thompson led the Bobcats with seven tackles and one quarterback hurry.











Ohio defeated lowa State 10-7 at home on Sept. 16 to mark its first Power Five win since 2017 and eighth-straight victory at home.

Ohio also had its first game without a turnover since 2022 that Saturday.

With the help of its defense, Ohio held lowa State to its first scoreless first half since 2019.

Redshirt sophomore cornerback Torrie Cox Jr. notched an interception for a 22-yard return in the second half to keep lowa State out of the endzone.

Graduate student wide receiver Sam Wiglusz scored Ohio's lone touchdown on a five-yard pass from graduate student quarterback Kurtis Rourke.

Rourke finished the game with 135 passing yards.




The Bobcats had an explosive game against the Falcons, which resulted in a 38-7 win at Doyt L. Perry Stadium.

They scored three touchdowns in the first quarter, including one on a 71-yard fumble recovery by graduate student linebacker Keye Thompson.

History repeated itself in the second quarter when redshirt junior cornerback Roman Parodie recovered a forced fumble for a 28-yard return.

Junior wide receiver Miles Cross put on the finishing touches with a 19yard touchdown to bump the score up to 38-0 before Bowling Green broke the shutout.

Ohio held Bowling Green to 206 yards on total offense for its second-lowest opponent total of the season.



Ohio defeated Kent State 42-17 on Oct. 7 to start 2-0 in Mid-American Conference play for the first time since 2016.

The Bobcats' defense recorded four sacks in the first half to keep the Golden Flashes off the board.

However, Kent State became the earliest team to score a touchdown on Ohio after they scored in the second quarter.

Junior wide receiver Miles Cross led the Bobcats with 125 yards and two touchdowns. Redshirt sophomore running back Sieh Bangura also contributed two touchdowns, one being his first of the season.

Freshman kicker Gianni Spetic also contributed to the score as he went 6-for-6 on PATs.

Graduate student quarterback Parker Navarro led the Bobcats in rushing with 65 yards on three attempts.









The Bobcats fell to the Huskies 23-13 on Oct. 14 in DeKalb.

Northern Illinois became the first team to score a touchdown in the first quarter against Ohio, too.

It sealed the win with a touchdown and a field goal in the third quarter.

Despite the loss, several Ohio student-athletes reached milestones.

Graduate student Kurtis Rourke's 159 passing yards broke 1,000 on the season and graduate student wide receiver Sam Wiglusz recorded his 100th reception as a Bobcat.

Rourke scored Ohio's lone touchdown on a 5-yard rush in the first half.





Ohio defeated Western Michigan 20-17 on Oct. 21 to become bowl eligible for the second season in a row.

Graduate student quarterback Parker Navarro came in for a snap to feed the ball to redshirt sophomore Sieh Bangura for the Bobcats' first touchdown of the game.

Ohio collected its second-most rushing yards of the season with 185. Bangura accounted for 85 of those yards.

Graduate student wide receiver Sam Wiglusz also contributed to the ball movement with 155 yards on 10 receptions for a new career-high yards in a game.

Wiglusz also contributed touchdown.



Ohio fell 30-16 to the eventual MAC Champions on Oct. 28 at home.

It was Ohio's first loss to Miami since 2019.

The Bobcats started the game strong on a sack by Graduate student defensive end Kwame Sutton, his second of the season.

Ohio's downfall was its lack of rushing yards. It collected 50 compared to Miami's 188.

Redshirt sophomore running back Sieh Bangura scored Ohio's first touchdown of the day on a 1-yard reception from redshirt fifth year wide receiver Tyler Walton.

However, Miami built a lead off of three field goals that Ohio could not catch up with despite holding Miami to its least passing yards of the season thus far.

Graduate student wide receiver Sam Wiglusz and junior wide receiver Miles Cross led the Bobcats with 79 receiving yards each.











Ohio defeated Buffalo 20-10 on Nov. 7 after a close game for its first road victory against Buffalo since 2019.

Graduate student quarterback Kurtis Rourke finished the game without an interception and threw 121 yards.

Redshirt sophomore Sieh Bangura led the ground game with 78 rushing yards on 17 carries for both of Ohio's touchdowns.

Freshman kicker Gianni Spetic aided the effort with two field goals and two PATs.

On defense, graduate student linebackers Keye Thompson and Bryce Houston led the team with 13 and 12 total tackles each.



Ohio defeated Central Michigan for the first time since 2011 on Nov. 15 to the tune of 34-20.


It was head coach Tim Albin's second ever win against the Chippewas.

Ohio scored on its opening drive via a 39-yard field goal by freshman kicker Gianni Spetic, who went 2-for-3 in field goals and 4-for-4 on PATs.

Graduate student defensive end Shane Bonner added to the score when he snagged a pick six on the next drive for his first career touchdown.

Central Michigan marked the sixth win that Ohio had the lead before halftime in.

It was also the second game in a row that Ohio did not have a passing touchdown. Graduate student quarterback Kurtis Rourke contributed a 16-yard rushing touchdown and 222 passing yards to the offense.



Kurtis Rourke became the second leading passer in program history during Ohio's 25-14 win over Akron on Nov. 24.

He threw for 208 yards to overtake his older brother. Nathan.

Junior wide receiver Miles Cross scored Ohio's lone passing touchdown of the game, while redshirt sophomore Sieh Bangura scored a rushing touchdown.

Bangura led the rushers with 121 net yards and 23 attempts while Rourke had nine carries on 10 yards.

On defense, graduate student linebacker Bryce Houston (Lewis Center, Ohio) led the defense with six tackles—including three solo stops—and one interception.

The Bobcats' defense held the Zips for the rest of the game, allowing Ohio's offense to reclaim possession for the final drive of the game.







## HEAD COACH



**TIM ALBIN** is in his third season as head coach of Ohio football after being promoted on July 15, 2021. Albin joined the Ohio football coaching staff as offensive coordinator on Jan. 4, 2005, reuniting with Frank Solich after four seasons together at Nebraska. The 2023 season will mark Albin's 19th year in Athens.

The 2023 squad finished the regular season with a 9-3 record, marking the first time Ohio football finished consecutive regular seasons with nine wins. Notably, Ohio defeated lowa State 10-7 at home (Sept. 16) to mark its first Power Five win since 2017 during a five-game winning streak. Later in the season, their 34-20 victory over Central Michigan marked the first time since 2011 the Bobcats defeated the Chippewas and the first time they won this matchup at home since 2000.

The 2022 football team finished the season as MAC East (7-1) and Arizona Bowl Champions with a 10-4 record, marking its first 10-win season since 2011 and the second-best turnaround in FBS football last year. The Bobcats were also undefeated at home, posting a 6-0 record on Frank Solich Field at Peden Stadium, and wrapped up the regular season with a seven-game winning streak.

This performance earned Albin MAC Coach of the Year honors, quarterback Kurtis Rourke MAC Offensive Player of the Year honors as well as the Vern Smith Leadership Award and running back Sieh Bangura MAC Freshman of the Year accolades.

Since his arrival in Athens, Albin has produced offensive units that have consistently ranked among the top of the Mid-American Conference. He also has directed an offensive attack that has practically rewritten all of Ohio's rushing, passing records, and scoring records.





In the past 10 seasons, Albin's offensive units rank No. 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 on the Ohio all-time Top 10 single season scoring list. The Bobcats 368 points in 2016 rank fourth on the all-time list.

Albin spent the 2004 season as offensive coordinator and running backs coach at North Dakota State, helping the Bison to an 8-3 record and No. 25 national ranking in their first season at the Division I-AA level. NDSU finished the season averaging 378.5 yards of total offense, including 192.4 on the ground, and had four offensive players named first-team All-Great West Football Conference.

Albin served with Solich at Nebraska from 2000 to 2003. He started with the Cornhusker program as a graduate assistant, a position he held for three seasons before being promoted to running backs coach and passing game coordinator for the 2003 season. Working with the Nebraska tight ends as a graduate assistant, Albin helped Tracey Wistrom earn third-team All-America status in back-to-back seasons.

Prior to his stint at Nebraska, Albin was the head coach at Northwestern Oklahoma State for three seasons, winning the NAIA national championship in 1999 with a 13-0 record. He was named NAIA Football Coach of the Year by Rawlings and American Football Coach Magazine as the Rangers recorded their first undefeated season in history. Six of his players earned NAIA











All-America honors. Albin's three squads improved every season going from 5-5 in 1997 to 7-3 in 1998.

Returning to his alma mater in 1994, Albin served as Northwestern Oklahoma State's offensive coordinator and head men's and women's cross country and track and field coach prior to his promotion to head coach of the football program.

He earned Oklahoma Intercollegiate Conference Coach of the Year honors twice for his work with the men's track program, leading them to back-to-back league titles. Albin got his start in coaching at Northeastern State (Okla.) in 1989 where he won two conference titles as an assistant football coach and two more as head of the men's track program.

As a player, Albin was a first-team All-Oklahoma Intercollegiate Conference selection as a wide receiver in each of his final three seasons as a member of the Northwestern Oklahoma State squad. He added to those honors by becoming the first Rangers' player to earn All-District IX status three times.

Albin received His bachelor's of science in business administration from Northwestern Oklahoma State in 1989 and a master's of science from Northeastern State in 1991. A native of Woodward, Okla., Albin was born on Sept. 13, 1965. He and his wife, Brooke, have two children - daughter Tori, and son Treyce.

The Ohio University Athletics Department is a dynamic team of student-athletes, coaches and administrators with a vision to demonstrate unprecedented excellence in athletics, academics and student-athlete development. Ohio offers 16 varsity sports with over 450 student-athletes competing at the highest level of collegiate athletics.

The Bobcats are led by Julie Cromer, who became Ohio's first female athletics director on August 31, 2019. Under her leadership, the Bobcats have enjoyed success both in the classroom and in competition. Ohio has competed in two bowl games, won one NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament game, competed in 4 WNITs, one NCAA soccer tournament and

had NCAA qualifiers in men's cross country and wrestling. In the classroom, Ohio's NCAA Graduation Rates have reached record numbers under Cromer's leadership with a 94% Graduation Success Rate in 2022, the third-straight year Ohio led the MAC and set a GSR record.

Ohio is a charter member (1946) of the Mid-American Conference. The Bobcats have won over 100 team titles across all 16 active sports. Ohio most recently won the Mid-American Conference earlier this season, when soccer won the MAC Tournament title to reach the NCAA Tournament for the first time in program history.



Ohio's football program has competed in 14 bowl games, with a 6-8 record. Ohio is currently on a four-game winning streak in bowl games, last winning the Arizona Bowl in 2022 over Wyoming. Ohio has five MAC championships, and six Buckeye Athletic Association titles, which they were a part of from 1910-1925.

Notable for Ohio athletes include Mike Schmidt (baseball), Jason Preston (men's basketball), Gary Trent (men's basketball) and Allie Laforce (women's basketball).


